
Thursday 28th March 2024

Nursery

It has been an exciting half term in nursery. The children have been noticing signs of Spring in our garden and we have been busy getting our allotments ready to plant some vegetables when we return to school. We have been exploring different techniques for painting and printing and have worked together to create a colourful Spring collage. We have been finding out about Holi, a Hindu festival and experimenting with using powder paints, something which is traditionally thrown during these celebrations! The children have really enjoyed our focus story 'One mole digging a hole' by Julia Donaldson and it has inspired lots of number work. We finished our half term by hunting for numbered eggs around the nursery. We would like to wish you all a very happy holiday and look forward to seeing you all in April!

Stars and Comets

Reception have had a great few weeks learning all about Spring and new life.

We started off with a welly walk and investigated signs of new life and new growth. We have been looking closely at flowers and the shapes we can identify in some floral artwork pictures. We created collages and shape-art inspired by the book 'The Tiny Seed' by Eric Carle.

One of our favourite activities has been experimenting with different painting techniques; we used printing, sponging, stamps, paint flicking, and finger painting to create a range of different textures and patterns. We then used our samples to piece together our own artwork flowers which we will be displaying at our Art Gallery event this week.

We will also be holding a silent auction to raise money for Reception resources and can't wait to find out how much money our collaborative artwork will make!

Glaciers and Icebergs

The children enjoyed learning about the monarchy through our enquiry sessions. They learnt facts about the royal family and thought about the qualities a good leader needs. In PSHE we have been learning about taking care of things- from our class and school environment to plants and babies. We said "goodbye" to Miss Valentine and are looking forward to meeting her new baby very soon. Our new enquiry question- How can we keep Max dry? Is based on the famous story Where the Wild Things are. We are learning about different materials and will design, build and evaluate a shelter for Max. Atlantic

We have had a very busy, exciting half term. Year 2 have thoroughly enjoyed learning about two famous nurses from the past - Mary Seacole and Florence Nightingale - and we can remember lots of facts about them. They also thought about the different ways we could find out about the past and looked at different sources of information.

In English, we have been doing lots of writing linked to our class book, Lights on Cotton Rock and have enjoyed using coordinating and subordinating conjunctions. We wrote our own stories about Heather's new adventures in space.

In Maths, we have been learning to measure in metres and centimetres. We have also been practicing the 2,5 and 10 times tables and have started learning about fractions.

We have also been experimenting with growing cress under different conditions and were surprised at how quickly it grew.

We have really enjoyed our Forest school session with ROAM. We toasted marshmallows, went on a scavenger hunt and created woodland clay animals. We had such a great time!

Sahara and Kalahari

What a fantastic half term we have had in Year 3! This half term, we have started a new enquiry answering the question: "How can mood and emotion be conveyed through art?" all leading up to our final expressive pieces showcased at our art gallery event. During our enquiry, year 3 have learnt all about how colour, shapes and lines can convey a certain mood alongside learning how to critically review ours and others artwork.

In maths, we have started learning all about fractions where children have begun exploring how to compare and order unit and non-unit fractions - we have been thoroughly impressed by their ability to pick up a new concept so quickly and efficiently!

Next term, we will begin a new enquiry into rocks and fossils.

Amazon and Congo

We have had a lovely half term in year 4. The children have engaged brilliantly with their swimming lessons, walking to and from the pool beautifully and working really hard to improve each week.

In English, we have been focusing on the story of Varjak Paw, and writing our own chapters that could be added to the story. More recently, we have been writing balanced arguments on which animal is more intelligent: cats or dogs.

In maths, we have had a strong focus on fractions, with the children exploring different types and ways to calculate fractions - they have worked incredibly hard and it has paid off!

In science, we have been looking at animals including humans, focusing specifically on our teeth and the digestive system. We completed an interesting experiment about which drinks cause the most damage to our teeth.

Our topic focus this half term has been the Normans, where we have been exploring many areas of their lives; their battles, their invasions and their lifestyles. The children have been so inquisitive and showed great interest in this topic.

Mississippi and Nile

What a fantastic term year 5 have had! We started the term with our Victorian topic; the children wrote some fantastic balanced arguments around whether they would rather be a child in 1894 or 2024. We had a Victorian Day in school; we went to visit the old workhouse in Taunton; had a workhouse experience in school and got to explore some Victorian artefacts sent from the museum.

We have moved onto our topic about living things and their habitats now and are exploring the question 'What is unique about the life cycle of a tortoise and a snail. Gary (Miss Glenn's snail) and Trinny (Mrs Eadie's tortoise) have come along to help us with this one! We have also been incredibly lucky to have Miss Oaten in to visit us to discuss babies as we explored the foetal development of mammals.

In Maths, we have been working really hard on our understanding of fractions, decimals and percentages. We are also getting very quick with our times table recall!

Kilimanjaro and Everest

This term we have been learning about Titanic, culminating in writing a newspaper report of the tragedy. Alongside the history, we have completed an art unit and we have been really impressed by the final pieces that the classes have produced.

In English, we have been studying the beautiful picture book "The Viewer." This has inspired some fantastic discussions and some excellent suspense writing.

We enjoyed a visit from PCSOs Kat and Jack. They talked about bullying and the impact of antisocial behaviour. The children then completed an activity to identify unacceptable and unlawful behaviours.

Last week, some of the children went to Channel Adventure. They took part in team building activities, learnt how to paddleboard and made their own pizza with varying degrees of success! The rest of us had a great day at Forest School. Unfortunately, the company running the day had to cancel (to be rebooked for later in the year), but we went ahead with activities which included den building and obstacle course design. Mr Knowles ran a session on netball skills and the children worked in groups to create artistic impressions of Titanic or re-enactments of the dramatic demise of the "unsinkable" ship. A day filled with kindness, team work, collaboration and laughter.

Premier Sports have been running three after school clubs this term and more clubs will continue after Easter. They will be able to use our wonderful field for some of these sessions as the weather improves.

Year 6s SATs booster clubs have been run this term by the year 6 staff and hopefully your child is benefiting from this extra support. These will continue after Easter.

Miss Brooks has been running a KS1 art club on Tuesdays and is offering an Environmental club during the Summer Term. Cheerleading club is also continuing, run by Emma Brown on Fridays. Thank you to all the staff and parents who give up their time to run these extra activities.

Mr Knowles has been accompanying children to after school sporting events with other schools - it's lovely to give our pupils the chance to compete in these events.

WEEK LONG SUMMER CAMPS FOR SCHOOL YEARS 2 - 6


Sleeping wader the stars When the children arrive at Cump an Manday earning, they are plused into a lest group with up to les other children, led by our committed and energetic tent leaders.

Big Church through high energy games, quizzes and startes.






